Source Type

Chapter/article in an edited book

Magazine article

Electronic journal article, with doi

Book, 3-20 authors

Journal article, print with no doi

Newspaper article, online

Webpage, corporate author

Book, one author

Online video clip

EBook, multiple editions

Journal article, up to 20 authors, include all

Electronic journal with no doi

Blog post

Webpage, no date

PowerPoint presentation, no specific author

Online dictionary, no author or editor

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
